Borzi, former Assistant Secretary of the Employee Benefits Security Administration of the U.S. Department of Labor (and longtime friend and colleague of Nell Hennessy).

Teams addressed current topics in employee benefits law through briefs and multiple rounds of oral argument.

After several hard-fought rounds, teams from Baylor University and the George Washington University met in the finals. After nearly an hour of argument and intensive questioning by the panel, the Baylor team of Keegan Coon and Cagan Baldree won the Best Team Award by a nose over the George Washington team of Carolyn Jones and Christina Hitchcock.

Albert Anaim from Catholic University won Preliminary Best Oralist.

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The third-place teams included Dylan Kochran and Trey Rodgers from William & Mary and Brianna Cooper and Kelly Guresik from Villanova.

The George Washington team of Carolyn Jones and Christina Hitchcock won the Best Brief award, and the Catholic University team of Ileana Elder, Bradley Krause, and Trenton Shook won the Best Brief Runner-Up.

The winners receive cash awards. The ACEBC[®] is also paying for the winning team to attend ACEBC[®]'s annual dinner, being held this year in Charleston, South Carolina.
